
To our visitors, donors, sponsors and friends!








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










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NEWS FROM ALUMNI

NEWS FROM THE CLASSROOM

COVID-19 is here to stay, and we're adjusting our academics accordingly.



At the end of our first term, on the 18 March 2020, as the COVID-19 Pandemic reached South Africa, we went into a hard and fast, three-week Lock Down, and all our schools were closed. When the Lockdown was extended, we began to implement distance learning to support all our students.

In a poor community, with many of our children living in small rural towns and on farms, this was an interesting challenge! Some students had family who were able to assist them with their school work, and we were able to send books home with them to continue learning. We also had success with sending out revision activities via WhatsApp messages. The students particularly enjoyed the social interaction they had via their class WhatsApp groups, and those who had access to WIFI, set up the occasional video call as well. Several families have chosen to home school their children with academic support from our teachers, for the remainder of this year.

During this time, our focus was on encouraging our students to do what they could academically, with a lot of concept revision and creative exercises to keep them motivated. Children were also encouraged to get involved and help at home. Some planted gardens, others helped to cook and others helped tend to the animals while some continued to develop their incredible artistic talents. We did everything possible to stay in touch with every student and make sure that they and their families were coping with the social challenges of COVID-19 in their communities. A few of our students' families were directly affected by the virus, but we are grateful that, despite a growing infection rate in our country, all of our students are still healthy.

On the 1 June 2020, we were able to reopen our school, with a whole new set of Health and Safety Procedures to follow! Fortunately, being a small school, with lots of space on the Orange Grove Farm, it was possible for us to introduce social distancing measures fairly easily. Our ACE offices, which already have screens around each child's work space, are perfect for reducing direct contact and allowing our students to continue working in a familiar environment. We have been so impressed with how the children have adjusted to wearing masks and how they have adapted to all the other new procedures.

At break time they have continued to run the 1km loop on the Orange Grove grounds, and to play tennis, all while maintaining social distancing. The younger students play "shadow tag", chasing each other and catching their friends by standing on their shadow. We have noticed how they have come together as a group, and are caring for each other well.

As the infection rate continued to grow in South Africa, we faced a significant, yet expected peak between August and September. Our government schools faced many challenges, and as a result, the South African Government decided to close schools again for a 4 week period in July. We chose to send work home with our students for the first two weeks of this period we were able to assist them and score their work via email and WhatsApp. We decided to end our term on August 7, followed by a much needed two week break. We are so thankful for the flexibility and patience we have seen in our staff, students and even parents during this trying time.

NEWS FROM THE (GRADE-R) CLASSROOM

On the 3rd of June 2020 Orange Grove School re opened for Grade R. The Orange Grove staff made all the learners feel at home by giving them a warm welcome and elbow shake. Even though we could see the fear in some eyes, mask irritations and the need for some tender, love and care, our younger learners adjusted swiftly.

With the blink of an eye, the learners adapted to wearing masks, social distancing and washing and sanitizing hands on a regular basis . Although only a small percentage of our learners returned back to school, parents had the option to keep their children at home and continue with the "Orange Grove Remote Learning" system in which learners are fully supported online. Well done to all the teachers and learners on an unusual yet very blessed second and third term.

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STRAIGHT FROM THE GROUNDS

The gift of time, some much-needed renovating and adjusting to Back2Nature online

The onset of COVID-19 and the subsequent lockdown brought about an opportunity to do some much needed building, maintenance and repairs to the buildings and farm infrastructure. The water pipes to the new staff housing area have been completed. Duncan (our operations manager) and his family cleared the first plot allocated to building the first home on Orange Grove. This has been a long-time dream of the iThemba team to start establishing families on the property. Orange Grove is blessed to have a consistent flow of spring water. It is truly an oasis in the desert.

Duncan is also involved in maintenance projects in town and on the surrounding farms. The external work helps to supplement salaries during this lean time and is an opportunity to extend the reach of iThemba to the extended community.

Cabbages and spinach were planted, just before the cold of winter set in, and are now being harvested. A portion of the crop is being donated to one of the feeding schemes being spearheaded by our local church. It has been such a blessing to be able to support the community with fresh produce during this very difficult time. The fallow lands are now being prepared for the next batch of cabbages, potatoes and beetroot.



Term 2 started with much uncertainty surrounding what was going to happen with school, so Back to Nature went online. In fact we started making little home videos during the holidays because it's always fun to learn about nature. We explored the effects of centrifugal force, learned about blood and how chameleons change colour. We had a good look at a water scorpion and watched it catch a dragonfly nymph. We watched Joanna make a raised bed vegetable garden as a lockdown project and learned about how bats can carry viruses but actually fill really significant and valuable ecological roles and do very little harm to people. We learned about herbariums and how to press plants.

Finally we went back to school where we could do a bit of tracking, go for a bush walk and also study the human body. We learned about how our weight would be different in space or on another planet and we did a dreaded test. And then school closed AGAIN! Since then we've looked at an antelope skin and learned about the role this plays, our largest organ as well as had a close-up investigation of muscles which is what we eat every time we sit down to a juicy steak.
