Thank you to everyone who reads our newsletter, who prays for us, who sponsors and donates, for gifts, and most importantly, to the team we have around us to make it all happen!



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# Going green

A little over three years ago the icea was planted to move the school over to renewable energy. Solar to be more specific. At the time there were continuous electrical disruptions and outages due to load shedding and storm damage. It was also predicted that the situation would get worse. Fast forward to today and indeed the loadshedding has got worse. Amazingly we are no longer affected by the disruption. The reason. We have installed a full solar system including batteries and a backup generator.

The idea was to install the system over time as funds allowed. Phase 1: Load reduction. Phase 2: Backup generator. Phase 3: Solar system, starting with the inverters, then solar panels and finally backup batteries. We expected the complete roll out to take place over a 5 to 10 year period (as funds allowed). So you can imagine our complete amazement and gratitude when a single donation was made to cover the cost of the entire system. What an amazing blessing and "problem" to have.



Phase 1 started by replacing all the fluorescent globes with low wattage LED. The backup generator was installed. Building on the small room to house all the equipment began late last year (Nov 2021) and was completed in Jan 2022. Dewald and the skills students began with the solar panels and the equipment was installed. The school was officially switched over to the sun on 25 April.

Since then we have been tweaking the system and balancing the load. We are still reliant on a little grid power to get through the night but the plan is to be completely "off grid" by the end of July. The load shedding has continued but thankfully we have been unaffected by this.



Building on the Mac Taggart's house had to take a pause during the solar installation project, but now continues with renewed vigour. The house frames are complete and the roof trusses and sheeting is scheduled to arrive any day. Duncan (our operation manager) expects to finish his house and be moved in by December of this year. This is the first house and we have plans for 5 more staff houses to be built in the coming year.

Rachael Spielmann along with little Connor spent the morning at Orange Grove all the way from Wisconsin, USA. Rachael was in South Africa with her husband, Brian, on a hunt with Ezulu Adventures. As we reflect on another wonderful term in the preschool, we are so thankful for the opportunities and experiences it brought. We had a wonderful term growing friendships, exploring various art avenues and continued learning. The hard work our students have put into sports practices paid off with many of our young students playing in various hockey, netball and soccer matches against other schools.





Horse riding started this term, which was the cause of much excitement throughout the classes. We ended our wonderful term with our annual cross country event. This was the first for most of the students in our preschool. All the students gave their very best efforts.







#### **Academic news**

The second term of the year is always a quiet term, with students who are new to the school this year settling in well, and becoming comfortable here. I would like to congratulate all our students who achieved Honour Roll this term, and who are showing incredible commitment to their acacemic work.

Our Grade 8 Online School students wrote their first high school exams, and, although it was a challenge for them, having not had to write exams previously on the ACE curriculum, they rose to the challenge and gave it their best!

As our High School begins to grow again, we are proud to be able to award two students with an Academic Scroll to wear on their blazers. Ethan Wait received this award after achieving excellent results in the first cycle of Grade 11 through the Online School. He managed to achieve subject averages 20% higher than the grade average in 5 of his six subjects. Lara Hood, Grade 8, also studying through the Online School, placed 2nd in her grade nationwide! Well done to both Ethan and Lara, these are both remarkable achievements, and we are very proud to have you representing our school.



### Media news

This term we started out having upgraded the media class to windows 10. This enabled students to be exposed to new design tools, thinking in digital ink and enjoying the advantages of the new software comparability more generally. We are thankful to both Microsoft and Adobe for assisting us in this regard. Our major learning objective for the term concentrated on basic colour theory implemented in 3D design. The major concentration was on the important connection between computer literacy and execution working across software platforms. All this is to develop critical thinking skills and creativity, improved concentration and memory

# Skills program

Magda Greyling has joined with Orange Grove Schools and 3 of their young men to implement a skills training program. Liya completed a composting workshop with about 20 people from all over Tarkastad attending. They collected compostable materials that were simply lying around and someone came from Kenton to do a demonstration. Simba did a soccer clinic for the primary school boys and girls in the local townships. On Monday the 20th June, close to 60 children gathered and from there 26 were selected to do 3 days of intensive training. It was extremely cold but they still came – such a commitment. Everyone loved it. Linomtha will be doing a beekeeping workshop in September with uncle Clyde. They already work together and will train people on that day about how to start their own beekeeping business.



Asa Smouse has also become involved in skills development training. She's a qualified Business, Executive and Life Coach. She provided individualised education programs according to each child's personal discovery through coaching. This included an 8-week Business Coaching program, whereby the requirement was for each learner to come up with his own business concept from the inception of the course in order to bridge the gap between theory and practice. Simba has established Young Stars—a junior soccer academy aimed at ages 5-12.

Linomtha has completed a short-course in Hotel Management.





This term has been one of our most exciting and busy sporting terms. We started off by playing netball and hockey matches against our neighbouring school just over the mountain, Bedford Country School. We won 3 out of 5 hockey matches and we lost 1 netball game and won 1 netball game. Playing against Bedford is always such fun as the competition between our two schools is always neck on neck. We also travelled to Queenstown to play against Hangklip Primary school. They are currently the best hockey school in Queenstown with many of their teams unbeaten during this hockey season. OGS played spectacular hockey. Even though we only won 1 match, we certainly gave them a run for their money.

Towards the end of the term we played hockey against Cradock Primary where we won 4 out of 6 hockey matches. Soccer and netball against Tarka High is always our toughest competition but nevertheless we gave them good competition. The highlights of the day were our U8 and U12 netball teams. These teams played excellent netball, with our U8's drawing and our U12's losing by 3 goals.







OGS mostly competes with schools that have 30 to 50 children in each grade to choose hockey players from. In some of our grades we only have 5 learners but our children always give it their best and never give up! Despite this we have had a very successful hockey season which proves that each individual learner in our teams are equivalent to 3 other players in the others schools.

With regards to the inter house points this term, cross country, archery and honour roll counted towards the final scores. The archery was closely contested but once again Kudu showed Gemsbuck who the better and bigger buck are, winning the archery with 658 points to Gemsbok's 615 points. The cross country score was even , 72 for Kudu and 72 for Gemsbuck. At the end of the honour roll points Gemsbok had 46 points and Kudu 41.

# **Cross Country**







At the end of term 2, we were fortunate enough to once again, after a 2 year break, host our annual regional cross country event. We had an exceptional day joined by Alexandria Christian school, the Winterberg Trust school and some home schoolers. Every student from OGS participated, including the preschool. We woke up to a crisp but clear winters day! Much excitement was in the air for an actual event and good competition for the runners.

The visiting school slept at our outdoor centre for the night, and survived a very chilly, below 0 degrees, temperature. This did not deter their enthusiasm! We are proud to mention that every student from OGS participated, whether they were good runners or not, they all tried their best! Even our little pre-schoolers ran their 1km with guts and determination. While all our athletes gave it their all, we had 3 students, *Liya Mayedwa*, *Imi Mayedwa* and *Amo Smouse*, who ran fantastic qualifying times for the National Event to be held later this month in Ermelo. A great day was had by all and we look forward to hosting the event in 2023 again.









After adding all the points the final score for the term is 733 for Gemsbok and 771 for Kudu!

# Archery

This term in archery we continued with our Feathers and Arrows development program and we are very proud of our archers who managed to attain new Arrows qualifications. We selected a handful of archers to attend a competition next term and they had fun fundraising by selling candy floss and sweets at the interschools cross country competition hosted on Orange Grove.

Our archers competed in their own interhouse competition and as usual, it was a close call but in the end Kudu House managed to take the win. Well done Kudu archers!



#### Back to nature

During the second term in B2N, we looked at forces and how they affect us with some object lessons involving arrows shot vertically, skateboards and shotguns. We expanded and studied our skull collection and discussed how different types of teeth are suited to different diets. We also continued our discussions on why creatures become extinct and students in grade 3 and up, did a poster project on an endangered species of their choice. We conducted fun quizzes with objects from nature, went for walks and discussed why the sea is salty.





## Horse riding

The children have done tremendously well with the riding lessons and we are very proud of their progress. We have been working on improving a number of techniques such as trotting and cantering and ensuring they get into a good rhythm when riding as well as maintaining a good posture. They have also done some bareback riding and have recently started some jumping. We have also introduced some theory about horses to broaden the children's knowledge of horses. They also learnt how to groom and tack up the horses.








