This term, our school received two long-awaited assets that have been highly anticipated. While the old farmlands were transformed into an athletics track years ago, the absence of a level sports field was a persistent challenge. The athletics track was constructed on a sloping terrain, resulting in a 400m track with both downhill and uphill sections.

Approximately four years ago, a small section of the land was leveled and grassed to accommodate a 100m sprint track. Recently, with the collaborative effort of our parents and a generous contribution from *Mr. Jason Willingham*, a significant portion of the remaining land has been successfully leveled and prepared. The funding facilitated the completion of the leveling process, installation of additional irrigation systems, and procurement of grass seed, which is scheduled for sowing early in the spring season.



Another valuable addition to our school's resources was a versatile multi-function tractor (**see the next page**). The farm has numerous tasks that require manual labor, which is not only time-consuming but also physically demanding. Thanks to a generous donation from *Mr. Jeff Holmes*, we were able to acquire the new tractor along with the necessary implements. Upon its arrival, the tractor was promptly utilized to repair the roads damaged by recent heavy rains.

Our anticipation grows for the forthcoming tiller and grass cutter attachments, both essential tools that have been on our procurement list for a prolonged period.

We extend our deepest gratitude to our donors for their generous contributions, which have transformed our longstanding dreams into tangible realities.

The Mac Taggarts have successfully relocated to their newly completed residence. In April 2020, *Duncan*, our Operations Manager, initiated the project by clearing the land and establishing his presence. Subsequently, construction progressed steadily, with *Duncan* taking a hands-on approach alongside a small team. Due to unforeseen circumstances, they transitioned to the completed garage section in August 2022, following the sale of their rental property in town. Progress continued, and by early June of this year, the remaining sections of the main house were finalized.

Future plans include constructing five additional homes for staff and their families who wish to reside on the farm. Emphasizing the integration of families into the fabric of both the school and the farm aligns with Ithemba's core vision. The Mac Taggarts' residency marks a pivotal first stride towards realizing this vision.








White rhino trail

Imagine the serenity of spending a night in the wilderness with only a camping mat, a sleeping bag, and the vast expanse of stars above you. Envision the responsibility of safeguarding your fellow campers while being vigilant for any wild intruders, ranging from lions, elephants, buffalo, rhinos, leopards, hyenas, and more. Five senior students and Ethan, our former matriculant, had the unique chance to transition from mere contemplation to firsthand experience in the untamed wilderness. Accompanied by Kitty, Dave, and two armed guides, they embarked on a remarkable five-day expedition in the expansive wilderness of the Hluhluwe-Imfolozi park in the Northeastern region of South Africa.

Their return was marked by a countless hair-raising encounters—from unexpected run-ins with elephants en route to the restroom, to narrowly escaping the stealthy pursuit of a leopard (later identified as a cane rat), and even unintentionally sharing a space with a python. One student had a close encounter when a snake descended upon her during her night watch duties.














This was not just another 'bush experience'. No phones were allowed and our trailists were completely immersed in the raw, wild, African bush for five unforgettable days. Carrying all essentials in substantial backpacks, meals were prepared over open flames, and campsites were meticulously maintained, leaving no trace of human presence. They were transported back in time to a world untouched by modernity, confronting primal fears of untamed creatures, walking among rhinos, elephants, buffalos, and hyenas, and even daring to swim in the Imfolozi River alongside crocodiles. This transformative encounter led many, if not all, to ponder their place in the world, recalibrate their life's trajectory, and reassess their duty to the natural environment.

Back 2 Nature

The Back to Nature experiments, initiated with plant cuttings in the previous term, were concluded this term, emphasizing the correct methodology for documenting experiments. Throughout this period, students delved into topics such as photosynthesis, atoms, and the distinctions among various animal classifications. Additionally, a new project was introduced aimed at fostering environmental stewardship, requiring students from grade 4 onwards to devise ways to give back to the environment for its invaluable contributions. Amidst these activities, birdwatching sessions were conducted with younger students, complemented by a nature walk that showcased the seasonal responses of plants and animals to the changing environment.







Archery

Throughout this term, our primary focus remained on enhancing the skills of our archers by extending their shooting range. To assess their progress, we organized a competition that attracted participants from various locations, including East London. The morning session was dedicated to traditional field targets set at challenging longer distances. In the afternoon, a more lighthearted approach was taken with archers aiming at life-size 3D animal targets, ranging from small rabbits to majestic Blue Wildebeests.

This event not only provided a delightful day for all involved but also served as a platform for our archers to engage with peers, unwind by the fire during a braai, and gauge their proficiency against fellow archers.

Adventure race

In early June, we hosted what is set to become an annual event known as the 'Adventure Race'. The event featured a trail run offering participants the choice between a 5K and 10K route, interspersed with various obstacles to add excitement. While the runners traversed the course, attendees and families had the option to enjoy pony rides, savor pancakes, hot chocolate, or even gin, while children reveled on the jumping castle.

Despite forecasts predicting cold and rainy weather, the morning unfolded beautifully, it was a little on the chilly side, but the rain held off until we all went inside for prize-giving. Runners have to follow orange tags through the bush and along farm roads between navigating obstacles including a balance beam, cargo net, zip-line and more. The event proved to be a resounding success, with approximately 40 participants successfully completing the course, including several students from Orange Grove. Special congratulations are extended to three of our Orange Grove Alumni (pictured above), who secured the top three spots; with *Liyabona Mayedwa* securing first place in the 10K race. His achievement earned him a prize of Merrell running shoes generously sponsored by Splitting Image Taxidermy.
